Upon completion of this course, the students should be able to:

- Develop a vocabulary of appropriate terminology to effectively communicate information related to anatomy and physiology (memorization and correct spelling of terminology are required).
- Recall and explain the interrelationships within and between anatomical and physiological systems of the human body.
- Make a connection between knowledge of anatomy and physiology and real-world situations, including healthy lifestyle decisions and homeostatic imbalances.

Everything you need to complete each week is outlined and linked in the lab agenda. Every week you are expected to watch lab videos and label worksheets using the videos and the lab manual. The videos are available from 8am on Monday until 8pm on Sunday of the scheduled week. The following week Monday through Wednesday, you should take the practice quiz (1.5 points each). You have unlimited attempts with the score of the most recent attempt recorded in the gradebook. It is followed by the lab quiz (15 points each, one attempt only) available 8am on Thursday through 8pm on Sunday. Quizzes have 15 fill-in the blank questions to complete in 15 minutes, and no proctor is required. Please see the rules for naming anatomical structure below. You may review your submission any time after the due date by going to *Grades* and clicking on the quiz.

Midterm and Final exams have 50 fill-in the blank questions each and weighs 50 points (1 point per question). No books/notes are allowed during the exams and both exams require proctoring. You have 50 minutes to complete each exam, one attempt only. You may review your submission only once immediately upon the completion while still under the proctor's supervision.

You can earn a maximum of 5% extra point by completing an extra assignment at the end of the term.

Please note that there are numerous variations in the nomenclature of anatomical parts, but we will only
accept terms EXACTLY as they are listed in the lab manual. For example,

internal carotid a., not internal branch of carotid a.;

profunda femoris a., not deep femoral a. or any other combination of thereof.

Please note that for cranial nerves, both <u>Name</u> and <u>Roman Numeral</u> are always required. For example, optic n. (II), not optic n. (2) or optic n.

- **Spelling** errors count as wrong answer, even if it is just one letter.
- Use the correct singular or plural form of the word. For example,

cerebral peduncle, not cerebral peduncles, if only one structure is pointed at; atria, not atriums when both structures are indicated.

- **Do not use unnecessary words**. For example: *apex*, not *apex of the heart*.
- Use one, not both of the alternative names. For example,

bicuspid valve or mitral valve, but not bicuspid (mitral) valve.

Please note that for cranial nerves, both <u>Name</u> and <u>Roman Numeral</u> are always required. For example, optic n. (II), not optic n. (2) or optic n.

- Read the question, it specifies what is required of you. For example, Name and <u>side</u> the vessel would require you to include *right* or *left*. The exception is the heart and the great vessels where the side should always be included. For example: *Name the chamber of the heart*. Answer: *right ventricle*.
- Abbreviations. When abbreviating, please use appropriate punctuation (period). The only allowed abbreviations are

a. for arteryR. for rightn. for nerveI. for ligamentv. for veinL. for leftm. for muscleb. for bone.

Duplication of letters in abbreviation indicates plural. For example: intestinal a.a.

Participation

Students are expected to actively participate in the class each week. Students are required to complete each assignment by the due date.

If a student fails to participate appropriately, the following actions may be taken:

- The student will be dropped from the course, OR
- If the date for dropping a course without penalty has passed, the student will receive a failing grade, unless prior arrangements have been made between the instructor and student.

A student who seeks an exception to this policy must do so in advance of the absence and/or provide documentation of the emergency that caused it, as determined by the instructor.

Proctoring
